

Words from Kevin our ordinand

If you were asked to think about the best way of 'doing' mission in the Church, I've no doubt that there would be many different answers to that question. It's a question the Church has asked itself from the beginning and still does as, if there were a simple answer, we would have found it by now. But, at its very heart is the telling of the good news of Jesus Christ and creating new lives from old, meeting people at their point of need, building them up and sending them out to do the same. However, to tell the good news, we must hear it and enable others to do so, not just once but every day and this Sunday's Gospel can show us a way.

The miraculous healing of the deaf man from the noisy, bustling Decapolis occurs after the man is taken away from the town by Jesus to somewhere quiet. The Decapolis in many ways is like our culture, noisy, secular, telling us we can create our own truths to fit our own stories, that almost anything can be labelled 'spiritual' and it's not surprising that many can't hear God and are spiritually deaf. If we're to show that there's another way of living, one of hope and eternal truths found in Jesus, we too must 'step outside', away from the noise and tune back into God through prayer, scripture and the sacraments so we can lead others to hear and experience him too.

And experiencing Jesus is the key. The healing of our friend in the Gospel was physical, intimate even with spittle on the tongue and placing fingers in his ears. It's as though he was being plugged back into God, Jesus was completing the circuit so to speak. Scholars suggest that these acts were part of a cultural healing practice and was the way Jesus 'told' him what he was doing. And he did it and that's the point. Jesus did what he said he would, he always did and still does now, through you and me. Yes, we must hear the word, but we must also 'do' the word so others hear it, see it lived out in our lives and then do it too. That's mission.

It's not easy, Mark does use a miracle to tell us this after all, but when we live authentic lives without division between what we say and what we do, when we hear God and act upon his word, then we can lead others to God and we'll create miracles too, everywhere we go. Take care.



Wells Cathedral Parish Pass

You may have seen in the news, that Wells Cathedral has announced changes to its admission guidelines with free passes for parishioners in the Diocese of Bath and Wells and local people, and a new entry charge for tourists.

Entry remains free to enter for worship, prayer, and to light a candle and free passes are available for parishioners in the diocese. Information about the Parish Pass and how to apply for it is available from the Wells passes section of the Wells Cathedral website. You will note that the application form for a Parish Pass does require a signature from a churchwarden or incumbent.

I will put a list at the back of church asking for help and for donations in October. We will also need help to publicise the event nearer the time e.g. display posters, invite friends etc.





Sustainable church flowers


There is a drive within many church communities in the UK, and further afield, to try and reduce the impact that church flowers have on the environment. This includes avoiding the use of floral foam/oasis which releases microplastics into waterways as a 'mechanic' behind arrangements. We are currently trying to use alternative 'mechanics' e.g. chicken wire, urns and vases for some arrangements.


Sustainability also means growing and using 'home grown' flowers wherever possible to reduce our carbon footprint. In order to try and do our bit to save the environment, the PCC has agreed that we can use one of the church's allotment plots to grow flowers for church. We will try and grow flowers that can be cut and brought into church from April through to October. This will hopefully reduce our reliance on imported flowers.

The plot needs some initial work, and I would like to have a small working party on Monday 16th September 10-11am (weather permitting) to do an initial assessment. If anyone can help and has gardening experience, then please let me know.

Ultimately, we would like to stage a sustainable flower festival in St. John's in July 2025 involving members of the congregation, children from our school and other community groups. Watch this space!
